Director's Biography Josh Tanner



In 2008, at the age of 20, Josh joined Brisbane based Perception Pictures and went on to direct the short films Embrace (2009), Deliberation (2010), and The Foal (2010), which collectively screened at screened at 50+ film festivals worldwide including Palm Springs, Brooklyn, Newport

Beach and Whistler Film Festivals. After a threeyear stint directing and editing commercial and documentary work, Josh co-wrote and directed the *The Landing* (2013), an ambitious period drama/ Sci-Fi short film, which made its world debut at the 46th Sitges International Fantastic Film Festival where it won Best Short Film, qualifying it for the 2015 Academy Awards®. *The Landing* has gone on to win Best Short Fiction Film at the 2013 IPAF ATOM Awards and Best International Short Film at the 38th Cleveland International Film Festival in 2014. The film has also been nominated for Best Film at several Oscar qualifying festivals including Warsaw, Austin, Foyle and Flickerfest film festivals and screened at over 25 film festivals worldwide.

Director's Statement

While on the surface The Landing will lure audiences into the exciting mystery of a UFO landing, and its desperate, presentday disclosure, my true intention is for audiences' tensions to be leveraged and moved by what is ultimately a very simple story about a father and son. It is a haunting tale of alienation; a universally permeating theme that explores the distance between these two characters, their differing ideologies and the disconnect between their past and present. 7

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

Australian films selected for Clermont-Ferrand

Clermont-Ferrand is widely regarded as the world's leading international short film festival and marketplace. In 2013, the festival had a total of 7737 films submitted and recorded 148,000 admissions; the concurrent market was visited by 3,300 filmmakers and executives including buyers, distributors, press, festival selectors and talent scouts.

"Our new short film marketing guide is designed to help filmmakers make good decisions about the life of their films from very early days. It is full of practical information and outlines how to negotiate the festival, sales and self-distribution landscape," she said.

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ATOM awards for First Footprints, Jabbed, Fallout

First Footprints, Jabbed, Fallout and Once My Mother were among the winners of the 2013 IPAF ATOM awards presented in Melbourne on Thursday night.

Founded in 1982 and voted by members of the Australian Teachers of Media, the awards recognise film and media excellence in the education and screen industry sectors.

There were more than 600 entries from Australian and New Zealand media producers in 29 categories. The event was hosted by Brian Nankervis from RocKwiz. The Intellectual Property Awareness Foundation (IPAF) was the naming sponsor this year.

Martin Butler and Bentley Dean's First Footprints, which tells how the first Australians adapted, migrated, fought and created in dramatically changing environments, was named best documentary, general.

Sonya Pemberton's Jabbed, which poses the questions how do you decide whether to vaccinate or not, and what are the risks?, took the award for best docu, science, technology and the environment.

Lawrence Johnston's Fallout, which celebrates the life and work of novelist Nevil Shute, whose novel On the Beach was turned into a Hollvwood film by Stanlev Kramer. was best docu, history, social and political issues.

Sophia Turkiewicz's Once My Mother, which traces Sophia's mother's Polish roots, her deportation with two million other Poles to the Siberian gulags and her miraculous survival, took the award for best docu, biography.















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Andrew Ogilvie's Desert War, an account of the war in North Africa during WW2, collected the prize for best docudrama (dramatised documentary).

The best factual TV series was Paul Clarke's Whitlam: The Power and the Passion. Ian Darling's Paul Kelly - Stories of Me was voted best arts docu.

The My Story My Content tertiary winners were Cinemorph by University of Adelaide's Carolyn Duchene and Film Gives Me Freedom by University of Wollongong's Aaron Lucas (audience award).



The Landing

As an Australian film about American Cold-War paranoia during the space race, *The Landing* doesn't seem at first like it would be successful. However, it may be that an outsider's look at American history is just as, if not more, poignant and gripping as an American's. Edward, raised by his father on a Midwestern farm, returns to his childhood home as an adult to dig up whatever landed there when he was a boy. A gripping sci-fi drama, the film's non-linear structure will keep you guessing up until the final reveal – which is nothing like what you expected. There are fantastic performances from all the actors, especially from Henry Nixon (whom you may recognize from tv series *The Pacific*), whose Father is drunk and brash, yet ultimately sympathetic. The film's switches from past to present are wonderfully handled in a *Tree of Life*-like manner, with nothing feeling contrived or unmotivated. *The Landing* ultimately tells the story that all childhood demons, no matter how fantastical, often hold more truth than we give them credit for.

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BYRON BAY FILM FESTIVAL: NOW THAT'S A WRAP

It's not often that a small, independent film comes along that packs as much punch as a Hollywood blockbuster. In fact, scrap that, yes it is - it happens all the time. The problem is that, with many groundbreaking and superb indie films struggling on a shoestring and with no extra budget for mass marketing or grandiose national tours, we rarely get to see them in the mainstream media.

That sucks! As a film lover, I feel cheated by the movie-making community at large, knowing that there are so many mindblowingly amazing films out there that I'll never get to see simply because the poor creators can barely buy beans on toast, let alone float an international release.

Thankfully, we in Byron Bay are lucky enough to have the Byron Bay Film Festival. Itself an event built on volunteer hours, the Byron Bay Film Festival offers an international consortium of filmmakers a forum upon which to showcase their work and us popcorn-munchers the opportunity to step out of the blinding Hollywood omnipresence and into something a little more humble, and often superior because of it.

Here are just a few of the 220 films being screened across five venues from February 28th to March 9th:

The Landing: Dramatically Diminutive

The gravity of The Landing (no pun intended) is astounding. Every scene oozes subtext and deep emotion, the confusion of a young boy whose already frayed relationship with his father is challenged further still by the sudden crash-landing of a UFO. Forbidden to explore for himself, the boy watches as his dad hauls a large bundle into the barn of his Kansas farm and bolts the door behind him. Skip to present day and the boy, now a greying man, still battles with the truths of these curious circumstances. In desperation, he returns to the home of his childhood to lay the ghosts of his past to rest.







Each dark and brooding scene is wracked with tension and mystery: what was in the UFO? Why is the father so abrasive and secretive? Why is the boy in present day still so traumatised by this childhood experience? Slowly, like pages of a book blown in a breeze, the truth reveals itself one layer at a time - and it's not what you think. Local filmmaker, Josh Tanner, builds as much intrigue, plot and drama in this 17-minute piece as you'll find in the average, full-length movie.
